Roof-Top Garden at Marks

Parsley, Sage, Rosemary and Thyme

Having become accustomed to valuing every square inch of space, Mark Pluhacek, founder and coowner of Marks Bistro in Dundee, hungrily eyed the flat roof top with access from the second floor and

envisioned a garden that could provide Marks' kitchen with fresh tomatoes and a wide selection of herbs, including all of those of Simon and Garfunkle fame – parsley, sage, rosemary and thyme. Now in its second year, the garden is flourishing, as are Mark's skills as a roof-top gardener. Even though this year's late spring arrival gave him a late start, the first rooftop tomatoes were harvested in mid-July, with the fresh herbs in use since June.

Mark designed and built the garden boxes and watering system, assuring that the plants would relish the hot, midsummer sun and grow to their maximum potential. With help from his wife, Kristin, and son, Leo, he planted the boxes in May and has nursed them along with great care.

It is not unusual for passersby on the sidewalk to catch a glimpse of Chef James Davis harvesting the freshest basil, thyme, rosemary and parsley for his culinary creations. Using the herbs in many of his specials, he also uses them daily in regular menu items such as the bruschetta, caprese salad, and mussels, not to mention bartender, Tim Kelly's, use of the freshly harvested mint in his popular mojitos.

When passing by Marks, take a look up and see how the garden grows – you may catch a glimpse of Mark tending his garden or Chef James reaping the harvest.



City Leaders use the "Good Neighbor" Ordinance

Ongoing alcohol-related problems at the edge of the Old Market prompted the Omaha City Council to use the "Good Neighbor" ordinance for the first time earlier this month. The ordinance, approved by the council in 2012, uses the city's zoning powers to set conditions around alcohol-sales establishments that better reflect our community standards, and allows the city more authority to address problem outlets. The standards simply encourage businesses to be a good neighbor by not adversely effecting or jeopardizing the public health, peace or safety of persons residing, working or using the surrounding area.

This summer, police officers have had to deal with several incidents involving bar patrons that have all been located near 11th and Farnam, where the restaurant and bar Maria Sangria serves food during the day and early evenings, but becomes a nightclub on some nights. The recent violence and crime in the Old Market raised the concern of many about the area's high density of alcohol outlets, and the outlet-related incidents that created community havoc and drained our city's police resources. The business will have the opportunity to clean up their business practices and abate the nuisances by adhering to acts set forth by the City Planning Department within the specified time frame. If they don't abate the nuisance as directed, the city council will have the ability to suspend or revoke the certificate of occupancy.

The City's first use of the "Good Neighbor" ordinance sends a strong message to all alcohol-sales establishments across the city – you have a responsibility to be a good neighbor, and the city is taking alcohol-related problems seriously in an effort to improve public health and safety, reduce crime, and provide cost savings to the taxpayers of the city.

We continue to be focused on ensuring that the city uses this valuable policy tool. We are asking neighborhood representatives to help us document any problems they are having with alcohol-sales businesses in their areas. With this documentation, we can help the city craft a process that will help city leadership quickly and efficiently address problems related to alcohol-sales establishments before they get out of hand. 

Benson Community Garden Event

Community Garden seeks Bands, Silent Auction items for annual Oktoberfest celebration

For their third year, the Benson Community Garden will present "Benson Oktoberfest" in September. This year the group scheduled the event for Saturday, September 14th starting at 5:00 p.m. Admission is \$10, which includes live music, bratwurst, side dishes, a silent auction and more. German beer and refreshments will be available in their enclosed biergarten tent. All ages are welcome, but those under 21 years of age must be accompanied by a parent.

"We are booking local musicians and bands to entertain the attendees," said Kurt Goetzinger, garden founder. "For our silent auction, we are seeking local businesses to donate items and gift certificates."

Funds raised from the Oktoberfest event will support outreach and programming at the garden.

Founded in 2011, the Benson Community Garden has become one of Omaha's more active and notable community gardens. The space includes 36 plots for individuals to grow their own fresh fruits and vegetables. In 2012 the organization started the "Neighbor Garden" which features nearly 400 square feet of vegetables for area residents. An "Earth Stage" was built to provide a venue for live music, cooking demonstrations and more.

Traditionally, Oktoberfest is a 16-day festival celebrating beer held annually in Munich, Bavaria, Germany. Running from late September to the first weekend in October. It is one of the most famous events in Germany and is the world's largest fair, with more than 6 million people from around the world attending the event every year.

August 4, 11, and 18 Rev. What Does It Mean?

How we read (and write) is changing. Again. Books to ereaders, letters to text messages. Harold Bloom wrote, "We read to find ourselves, more fully and more strange than otherwise we could hope to find." We read looking for meaning, but this is not as straightforward as it seems. There is an entire discipline, called hermeneutics devoted to our search for meaning in the way we read, understand, and interpret texts, particularly the Bible. We'll explore all these topics and more by reading and discussing the provocative book A Short Introduction to Hermeneutics by David Jasper. Led by Rev. Dr. Scott Jones, Senior Minister at First Central

August 4: The Rise of Liberalism

If I bring my own feelings to reading, or the latest historical and scientific information, then what I believe about the Bible, especially, will change. Following developments in the sciences and the Romantic age, we understood ourselves and world differently and, in the process, reading became a threat to traditional interpretations of scripture.

August 11: Things Fall Apart

The Twentieth Century was not a liberal triumph, but saw the rise of fundamentalisms and global violence, while technology brought us into the age of mass media. Modernism collapsed, leaving some wondering "Is meaning even possible?" Did we reach the end of interpretation?

August 18: A Web of Endless Intertextuality

"What is quite clear is that texts do not live in isolation from one another and that to read one text is a kind of gateway into all other texts that have gone before and that will come after it." We enjoy (or are trapped in?) a variety of postmodernisms and a widely expanding concept of texts that includes film, television, and cyberspace. Is there meaning in this labyrinth?




