Dundee Community Garden Watermelon Feed July 20

It's watermelon time! Please stop by the Dundee Community Garden at 4902 Underwood on Sunday July 20, from 3-5 p.m., for a slice of cold watermelon (50¢ a slice.) While you're at the garden, we'll give you a tour: we'll show you the solar-powered lawnmower (powered by the solar panels on the tool shed), the new strawberry patch under the fruit trees, and our native wildflower pollinator plant area.

Solar Power: In spring 2014, we installed three solar panels on our tool shed, to power the electric lawn mower and weed whacker. The sloped south-facing roof of the shed is ideal for solar energy generation. The solar panels produce DC (Direct Current) electricity that is stored in a large battery inside the shed. Then an inverter turns that power into AC (Alternating Current) with a standard wall outlet plug. Our "green machines" are charged with clean energy to keep the garden looking great all season long. Contact DCG for a tour of our off-grid solar system.

Native Wildflower Pollinator Area: Pollinators are needed for the reproduction of over 85% of flowering plants, and one third of our food supply is dependent on pollinators. Unfortunately, due to habitat loss and pesticides, pollinator populations are in serious decline. The most important step individuals can take is to plant flowers in their own home gardens, no matter the size of the garden, and to choose native plants wherever possible, as they have evolved with native pollinators and the local environment.

DCG is grateful to Tom Lundahl of Meristem Nursery for his donation of native prairie wildflowers, which are very attractive to pollinators. Donated plants include Rattlesnake Master, Wild Quinine, Spiderwort, and American Mountain Mint. These plants were planted along the north (alley) side of the garden in June. Meristem Nursery is in Papillion and can be found at the Farmers Market on Sundays at Aksarben.

We also appreciate the donation of five flats of flowers from Rebecca Bloom of Bloom's Organics.

Donated plants include zinnias, whose bright colors draw pollinators to the garden, and butterfly milkweed, which is essential to the survival of monarch butterflies. Monarchs will only lay their eggs on milkweed, and their larvae appear to feed exclusively on milkweed.

Educational Events:

On Wednesday, July 30th, at 7 p.m., DCG will host an "Herbs from the Garden" workshop with Chelsea Taxman, co-founder of Black Iris Botanicals. Chelsea will lead participants through the Dundee Community Garden to explore herbs. She will provide tips and techniques for preserving herbs for culinary purposes, and participants will make some simple home salves and lip balms. Cost or workshop materials is \$5. Workshop size is limited and RSVP required: info@dundeegarden.org, or call 402-415-1081.

Our final class in collaboration with the library's Summer Reading program will be teaching a composting class for elementary-school age children, "Red Wigglers: Composting with Worms," on Sat. July 19, from 2–3 p.m. at AV Sorenson Library.

Entranceway Coming Soon: Our new entrance-way construction should be underway very soon. The Dundee Community Garden serves as an entry to the Dundee neighborhood, and we hope that the new entranceway will welcome people to the garden and to the Dundee neighborhood.

Ice Cream Social: The Dundee Community Garden hosted an Ice Cream Social at the garden on June 22. Over 100 people came to enjoy making their own ice cream sundaes, stroll through the garden, and visit with neighbors and new friends. Children (and adults) were treated to free face-painting. Special thanks to eCreamery for the generous donation of chocolate chip and salted caramel ice creams!




Vintage Market Sundays

What is a Little Free Library?

It's a "take a book, return a book" gathering place where neighbors share their favorite literature and stories. In its most basic form, a Little Free Library is a box full of books where anyone may stop by and pick up a book (or two) and bring back another book to share. You can, too!

Denise Pecha first read about Little Free Libraries two years ago. She and her husband, Ted Kyster, believed in the mission of the Little Free Libraries: To promote literacy and the love of reading by building free book exchanges worldwide. To build a sense of community as we share skills, creativity and wisdom across generations.

Ted and Denise installed their Little Free Library (charter name: Long Time Coming) on Father's Day this year in their front yard at 5803 Rees St. The response has been better than they expected. The library is not just encouraging reading, it's giving neighbors opportunities to get to know each other. "We have met more neighbors in the past couple weeks than in years of walking our dog daily!" There are books for all ages and the neighborhood has embraced the Little Free Library. For example: a toddler excitedly jumping up and down in front of the Little Free Library ready to return the nursery rhyme book and select a Paddington Bear book which she will open and "read" on the walk home. The



young man walking his dog stating "This is a really great idea and makes me want to go home and bring back a really cool book." New books are added to the library almost daily. We encourage everyone to "check out" this Little Free Library or one in their neighborhood.

Blackstone Neighborhood Revitalized

In 1913 the deadliest tornado to ever strike Omaha damaged buildings in the 40th and Farnam area as it headed northeast across the city. Residents of the fashionable district, then known as West Farnam, recovered and rebuilt.

Following a two-decade period of neglect and crime that saw many storefronts boarded up, the residents and business owners of the area have again recovered and rebuilt. The area now known as the Blackstone District is a whirlwind of activity and optimism.

Two new businesses have opened since May and several others are set to open in the next six months.

Photographer Brad Iwen, who heads the Blackstone Business Improvement District, has been a catalyst for change. Since purchasing and rehabbing his studio at 3925 Farnam St. in 2008, Iwen has been on a mission to reinvigorate the neighborhood. A big part of that mission—which will be realized in September—has been to convert Farnam to a two-way street between 36th and 42nd Streets. He and his wife, Julie, even organized festivals to raise awareness of the neighborhood and its potential. The two-way designation goes beyond painting a yellow center line. Aside from making traffic patterns more conducive to a neighborhood, there will be aesthetic and commercial mprovements: underground electrical wires, diagonal parking stalls, and new street lights and poles. Banners touting the newly christened neighborhood will adorn those.

Dan Godsey, who set up his woodworking and remodeling business at 3920 Farnam St. in the former Kaufmann Pastry Shoppe, has seen an unexpected uptick in business from his neighbors since arriving two years ago. When he moved to the neighborhood, it was "pretty well boarded up," Godsey said. He has worked on several projects in the area, including building a walnut bar for Sullivan's. "It's really exciting to see the things that are going on," he said.

Sullivan's Bar has called the neighborhood home since 1954. Seeking more space and more light, owner Dan Houlihan and crew moved the drinking establishment to the southeast corner of the intersection after purchasing and rehabilitating that building. Bartender Patrick Capecci said he,

Houlihan and other staff put a lot of "sweat labor" into shoring up the foundation and roof of the formerly condemned property. In refurbishing the building—most recently Cheater's Lounge and for 50 years home to the Embassy Club—the staff uncovered original arched windows and exposed ceiling trusses. He said it's exciting to see all the changes in the neighborhood. "There's no competition. We all support each other, everybody gets along great," Capecci said.

Chef Hiomara van den Boogaart and restaurateur Michael Sanchez opened Mula's Mexican Kitchen and Tequileria on the northeast corner of 40th and Farnam in late June. Opening weekend saw good business at the establishment, which features "street style" Mexican food, tequila cocktails and Mexican beer.

Next door at Archetype Coffee, owner and barista Isaiah Sheese is pursuing excellence in the coffee trade as he welcomes neighbors to his business, the former home of Sullivan's Bar. A Bloomington, Indiana native, Sheese has 10 years experience in the coffee business and hopes to cater to both coffee aficionados and novices.

Still to come is Scriptown, a microbrewery named for an old subdivision of Omaha. Brewer John Fahrer and restaurant owner Scott Stephens are renovating 3922 and 3924 Farnam into a tasting room, brewing area and patio. It will likely open in late summer.

Mula's, Archetype Coffee and Scriptown are all part of Blackstone Place, owned by developers Jay Lund and Matt Sweeney. The two restored the former Mitchel Apartments on the second floor of the building into seven one-bedroom apartments.

Lund and Sweeney are also behind Blackstone Corner at 39th and Farnam. Blackstone Corner will house a yoga studio and three other businesses in the former Katelman's Antiques warehouse. The adjacent home once occupied by Katelman's Antiques at 144 S. 39th St. will now house 10 office spaces, along with a kitchen and conference room. The project may be completed by the end of the year. Longtime businesses in the district include Oxide, a design firm, and The Icon Studio, a hair salon. Little Lambs Daycare and Preschool has been operating on the south side of Farnam since 2010.


