LeadBelly Chooses Midtown Crossing

A long-simmering plan to bring LeadBelly's brand of flavorful, affordable dining to Midtown Crossing is finally coming to fruition. The Lincoln-born concept – billed as a "Contemporary American Pub" – is taking over the space formerly occupied by Ingredient with an expected February launch date.

"We're very much a casual-comfortable place where you can come in both with friends as well as family," says Mike Martin, a co-owner of Red Herring Concepts, the hospitality company that runs LeadBelly.

The restaurant specializes in made-from-scratch, high quality pub food from around the world, including gourmet burgers, tacos, sandwiches and salads with a large selection of hand-crafted beers, whiskeys and wines – all at a "comfortable price point," Martin says.

In a break from the Lincoln concept, LeadBelly-Midtown Crossing will feature an expanded entrée section that includes wood-fired pizzas and "a lot more steak, seafood and other dinnertime options that we feel might be an opportunity for us in Midtown."

What will remain unchanged is a restaurant design that conveys comfort. "We use a lot of reclaimed materials, everything from barn wood floors to reclaimed doors. So it's going to give that feel of a 'lived in' look with just a little bit of a contemporary twist," Martin says.

Omaha's newest holiday highlight is set to return to Turner Park, and plans are currently underway! 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Water Conservation – What can a homeowner do?

Over the last 30 years, Omaha averages 30.63 inches of rainfall per year. Through October 2015, we are already at 36 inches with half of this rainfall coming in August and September (www.weatherunderground.com). Furthermore, 2014 recorded 39.15 inches of rainfall, the highest in over 20 years. Even with all this rainfall, the average MUD residential customer (i.e. household) consumes 89,000 gallons of water per year, which is 244 gallons/day at a cost of \$350/year (<http://www.mudomaha.com/water>)! Where is all that water going?

A surprising amount of water is lost in water leaks. According to the EPA's Water Sense Program, the average U.S household leaks 10,000 gallons/year of water, with 10% of U.S. homes leaking 32,850 gallons/year or 90 gallons/day. Check your water meter before and after a 2-hour period where no water was used. If the meter doesn't read exactly the same, you have a water leak somewhere. The most common source of water leaks is a leaky toilet flapper. Place a drop of food coloring in the toilet tank. If the color shows up in the bowl within 15 minutes without flushing, you have a leaky toilet (make sure to flush after this experiment to avoid staining the tank). Secondly, a leaky faucet or showerhead that drips 10 drops per minute wastes 500 gallons/year per faucet!

After you seal all your water leaks, consider adding faucet aerators to all your faucets (typically \$2/faucet) or replace your old faucets and showerheads

with a WaterSense certified product. WaterSense labelled products and services have been certified by the EPA to be at least 20% more water efficient than standard products without sacrificing any performance. EPA's WaterSense program works like EPA's Energy Star Program, where more efficient products are certified and labelled to encourage customers to purchase these products. The WaterSense website, (<http://www3.epa.gov/watersense/index.html>), is a wealth of information, and I highly recommend you visit.

Now that you've sealed all your leaks, added aerators to your faucets, upgraded to WaterSense labeled showerheads and toilets, you are now ready to tackle the domestic hot water heater (DHW). Most existing DHW systems are design for water to flow one-way from the DHW to the faucet, then down the drain and out to the sewer. However, adding a pump, some piping, and controls, the standard one-way water distribution can be easily converted to a recirculating DHW system. So when hot water is "called" by the showerhead or faucet, the cold water first delivered to the faucet is sent back to the DHW instead of going down the drain. For the average household, this would save 12,000 gallons/year per showerhead.


