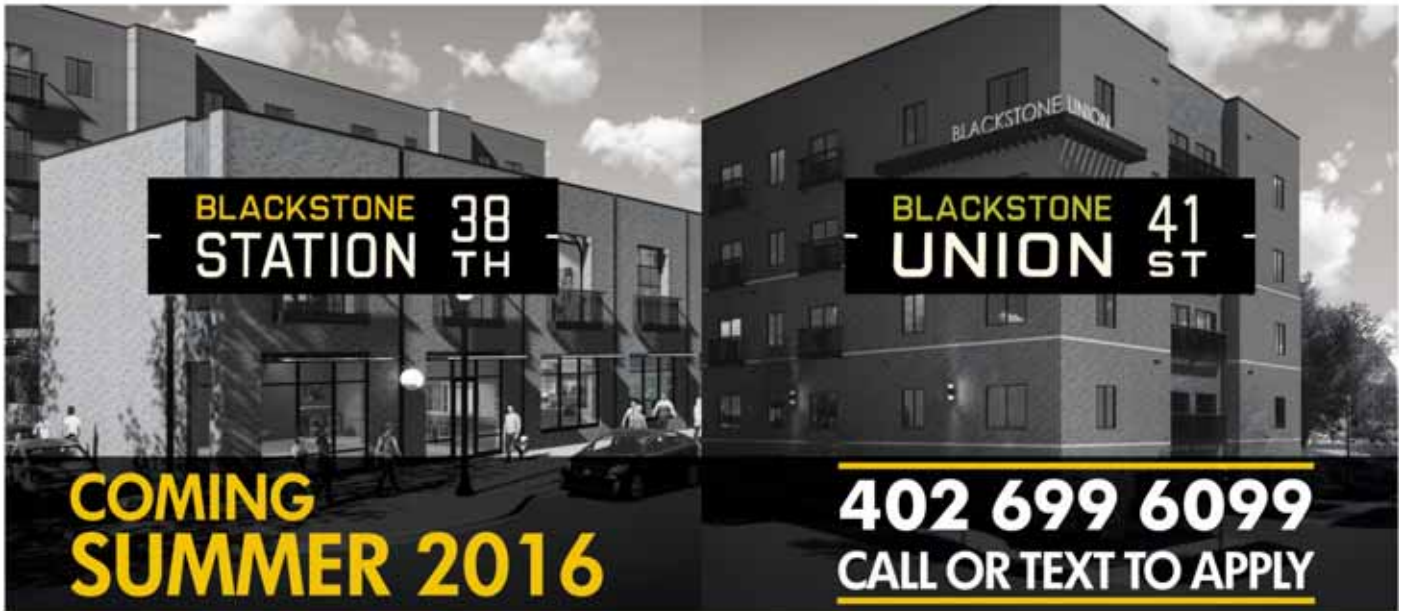

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New book: 'The Next Pandemic,'

details adventures of UNMC dean/former CDC leader



The extraordinary life-time adventures of Ali S. Khan, M.D., M.P.H., dean of the University of Nebraska Medical Center College of Public Health, as he worked to contain some of the world's deadliest diseases, are described in his new book, "The Next Pandemic: On the Front Lines Against Humankind's Gravest Dangers."

Dr. Khan spent 20 years at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), including five as the director of CDC's Office of Public Health Preparedness and Response. Now, as dean, he has an important voice in the global conversation about how to survive the next pandemic.

"Tracking down disease outbreaks is an exciting and intimate mix of science and art," Dr. Khan said. "I am thankful for the opportunity to share a behind-the-scenes look at the work of disease detectives to protect their communities and how to get ready for the next pandemic."

"The Next Pandemic" is a vivid, humorous and unrestricted view of rampant and violent diseases, disasters narrowly averted and the tools we have to keep them at bay. It provides an inside account of the fight to contain the world's deadliest diseases and the panic and corruption that make them worse.

In each of these stories, Dr. Khan reconstructs the chaos of those first moments on the ground, making life-and-death decisions based on limited and conflicting information, with local, federal and international authorities fighting to contain both the virus and the panic.

Dr. Khan feels the next pandemic will spawn from five sources -- mutation; spillover from other species; lab accidents; bioterrorism; and natural disasters.

He shows that the danger of an outbreak is more real than ever in a world of climate change and global commerce, but that we need not live in fear. His career is a testament to the power of good information, habits and poise under pressure, as we work to fight whatever exotic contagion comes next.

"Infectious diseases are inevitable, but the next pandemic is not with better foresight, science and preparedness to protect the health in our communities," Dr. Khan said.

The book, published by PublicAffairs, a member of the Perseus Books Group, was released May 24, and can be pre-ordered now on Amazon in hardcover or kindle editions.

Omaha Public Library introducing Toy Library

Developing literacy and learning skills for Omaha Public Library's (OPL) youngest patrons is a priority, and part of that learning experience for children includes toys. Yet, some families in our community may not have access to a variety of toys due to economic or special needs.

Starting June 1, patrons can peruse over 100 types of toys listed in OPL's online catalog, or browse through a printed list available at each of OPL's neighborhood branches. Toys will be stored offsite and can be reserved online or through library staff and sent to any location. Toys in the collection are geared toward children ages 0-8 years. Patrons will find a variety of toys including dolls, musical instruments, building blocks, games and more! Two sets of toys may be checked out to one cardholder at the same time. Items are subject to the same lending terms as checking out a book.

"Toys are a terrific way to teach children and develop literacy skills," OPL Executive Director Laura Marlane said. "OPL's staff worked to create a collection of toys that will inspire imagination, learning and fun."

This new collection is a valuable extension of special collections that librarians curate with educational activities such as Sensational Science Kits, Storybook Buddies Bags, and themed story boxes. These new learning tools are just one of the many ways that OPL strives to provide materials and services that promote literacy and contribute to the well being of our community's youth.

Funding for the Toy Library was made available through donations to the Omaha Public Library Foundation from The Sherwood Foundation and the Adah and Leon Millard Foundation.

Residential Indoor Air Quality

If you have ever noticed that kitchen smells tend to linger longer, or that dust builds up quicker in one part of your home than another, or your family's allergies or asthma have worsened, than your home probably has an indoor air quality issue. The EPA estimates that air inside residential buildings are often 2-5 times worse than outdoor air. Indoor air quality (IAQ) refers to the air quality within buildings as it relates to the health and comfort of building occupants. IAQ is subset of Indoor Environmental Quality (IEQ), which also includes noise, light quality, thermal comfort, humidity, odors, and even vibration. While our understanding of residential IAQ and IEQ has exploded in the past 5 years, there is much we still don't understand. Unfortunately, IAQ best practices still aren't being integrated in the greater Omaha marketplace either in new construction or remodels.

IAQ includes, but is not limited to the following categories: temperature, humidity, particulates, volatile organic chemicals (VOC), carbon dioxide (CO₂), and carbon monoxide (CO). High indoor temperatures and humidity can lead to an increase in airborne bacteria, mold, and other biological materials. Particulates are airborne materials such as dust, dirt, soot, smoke, and liquid droplets. According to the EPA, particles less than 2.5 micrometers in diameter are referred to as "fine" particles and are believed to pose the greatest health risks. Because of their small size (approximately 1/30th the average width of a human hair), fine particles can lodge deeply into the lungs. VOC are chemical pollutants like formaldehyde, toluene, xylene, and other organic compounds typically found in building materials like sheath

ing, drywall, and carpet. While VOCs are still allowed in building materials in our market, low VOC and VOC-free building materials are readily available across the U.S, so make sure you request these building materials on your next project or home.

For most existing homes, the worse IAQ is in your kitchen, followed by your bathrooms, then your basement or rooms containing your furnace and hot water heaters. Your kitchen and bathrooms should all have exhaust fans, which exhaust air directly to the outdoors, not your attic or garage, by a rigid metal duct. Your furnace and hot water heater should also be vented directly to the outdoors by a mechanical motor, not by natural draft, which is the case in about 90% of hot water heaters in midtown homes.

Currently, there are about a dozen residential, digital IAQ monitors on the market, many for under \$200. Several of these products have been reviewed here (<http://www.energycircle.com/guide/guide-indoor-air-quality-monitoring-devices-healthy-home>), and here (<http://energysmartohio.com/blog>). To improve IAQ, first clean or replace your furnace's air filter monthly. Second, clean your ducts if they've never been cleaned. Third, air seal your house. Fourth, add mechanical ventilation to kitchens, bathrooms, and natural draft combustion appliances. Finally, add mechanical ventilation to the rest of the house and adjust your air handler to properly balance the air movement throughout the house.

Turner Park Set to Host International Light and Color Experience Exhibit to Coincide with US Olympic Swim Trials

Midtown Crossing is primed to celebrate the Omaha return of the US Olympic Swim Trials by making a brilliant splash of its own. Starting Friday, June 24, neighborhood guests will be encouraged to get in "The Pool by Jen Lewin," a world-renowned, fully-interactive light and color experience.

Created by American artist Jen Lewin, her studio describes The Pool as "an environment of giant, concentric circles created from interactive pads. By entering The Pool, guests enter a world where play and collaborative movement create swirling effects of light and color."

The Pool will take up residence in the southeast quadrant of Turner Park until July 4. The US Olympic Swim Trials run June 26 – July 3 at CenturyLink Center Omaha. The display is free and open to the public.

A world-travelling piece, The Pool has been included in festivals in Singapore, Sydney, Lisbon, Prague, London, Istanbul and at Burning Man and has clocked millions of user steps. It is weather resistant and designed for aggressive use: "Like a giant game of light 'ping pong,' the pool will have users running and jumping, adding, bouncing, and mixing light together. As multiple users play in The Pool, their interactions become mesmerizing patterns of shifting and fading colors." (jenlewinstudio.com)

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
