## Letter From the President

### The Noise of Time

Normally, this time of year, it seems football is a focus of much conversation. This year is different. It is not that there is no football talk, but election talk is everywhere, and does not bring warm and cozy feelings to any of us. What we need now, even before the election, is a time of healing. I recently read a book by British author, Julian Barnes, *The Noise of Time*. What a beautifully written book it is – about the Russian classical music composer, Dmitiri Shostakovich, with much focus on the period of his life in the 1930's, when at one point was declared the peoples' enemy based on an opera he composed that displeased the political powers. One passage in the book, so eloquent, made me think about our current stressful – and noisy – times in a new way. I beg your patience as I share it with you, and I hope you find beauty and hope for the human spirit in it as I do.

"What could be put up against the noise of time? Only that music which is inside ourselves – the music of our being – which is transformed by some into real music, which over the decades, if it is strong and true and pure enough to drown out the noise of time, is transformed into the whisper of history."

### Trees – November DMPA Meeting

At our November neighborhood meeting, on the 14th (always the second Monday), we will hear all about the emerald ash borer threatening the city's substantial population of ash trees, and how the loss of these trees will affect our neighborhood. Our guide to matters of trees will be Diana Failla, President of the Midtown Neighborhood Alliance and Executive Director of Urban Bird and Nature alliance. Over the past month, I have been thinking quite a bit about trees – and unsuccessfully searching for a poem I remember from years ago entitled "The Speed of Trees" – and pondering their majesty, strength, beauty, and how much they give us by just being among us. I came across a well known poem by Ella Wheeler Wilcox, "Go Plant a Tree." I will not share the entire poem here – don't want to try your patience – but a few excerpts:

"God, what a joy it is to plant a tree  
And from the fallow earth to watch it rise,  
Lifting its emerald branches to the skies...."



# More Trees for Dundee

Again this year, Dundee-Memorial Park participated in the Re-Tree Midtown program of the Midtown Neighborhood Alliance. This program provides new trees to be planted along the public right of way at no cost to homeowners. Dundee-Memorial Park has participated every year since 2008 with nearly 200 new trees having been planted in our neighborhood.

This year's plantings were on Webster St., Burt St., Cuming St. and Iizard St. between 50th St. and 52nd St. A total of 21 new trees were planted by volunteers organized by Boy Scouts Jack Pfeiffer and Simon Smith. We had a fantastic turnout of volunteers on October 8th and Oct. 22nd for the plantings. As the City continues to remove old Silver Maple and Ash trees, programs like Re-Tree Midtown become even more important as we try to maintain the neighborhood's mature tree canopy.

Recently an acquaintance of mine asked me to describe life in Dundee. “Wild”, I replied. (Now I had his full attention.) “Wild, huh, as in lots of parties, swinging singles, that sort of stuff?” he asked eagerly. “Uh, no. Wild as in lots of wildlife, you know critters running freely.”

I swear the raccoons, possums, squirrels, rabbits and all other types of wild animals catch the midtown bus to move to Dundee. I think they have heard how good life is here with no real predators except for the occasional unchained dog or cat on the prowl. Big trees, mature bushes and even chimneys provide safe haven and cozy homes for urban wildlife. And Dundee residents are notoriously soft-hearted and kind to animals, so no wonder we have lots of them roaming about freely. But they can become pests.

Take for example Donna’s case. Donna, a Dundee neighbor, wrote about her animal concern:

“We recently realized that bats are living behind the siding loosened by roofers at the top peak of our house.

Do you know someone who rids our old houses of these or do you have an idea how to?”

Bats are a common problem in older neighborhoods. Almost everyone I know in our neighborhood has a bat story or two.

Here are a couple of options to get them out of your house.

The Animal Control division of the Nebraska Humane Society will remove bats (and other critters) but only if they present a danger or are injured. For the removal bats in your attic, walls or other places you will need to use a company that catches critters. There are several companies in the Omaha area who offer these services. Just make a quick Google key word search for “bat removal Omaha”.

Or you can remove them or, more correctly, let them remove themselves by creating a one way door.

Here's how you do that:

1. Use 1/4- to 1/2-inch wire screening or heavy plastic mesh to cover the bats’ points of entry. Cut the screening so that it covers the width of the hole and extends approximately 3 feet below the hole. Bend the screen into a tunnel that projects 3 to 5 inches from the side of your house so that the bats can crawl between the screen and the building and exit at the bottom.

2. Secure the mesh at the top and sides with duct tape or staples and leave the bottom open.

3. Leave the one-way door in place for at least three to five days or until you are sure that all bats have left the building, then remove the door and permanently seal the opening.

The reason this method works is because bats find their way around mostly by sense of smell rather than sight. So they will come back to the opening in the siding and are able to smell that they are home through the mesh, but they won't be able to crawl through the mesh there and they aren't able to see their way back from the end of the screen tunnel.

One note of caution...you should wait until September or later to do this. Bats bear their young from mid-May to mid-August and if you block the adults from getting back to their young the baby bats will starve to death. Not only is this cruel and inhumane, you probably don't want to cope with the smell of dead animals inside your home.

# Dundee Community Garden Fall Update

It's time to wrap up another great gardening season at the Dundee Community Garden. We had a lovely fall and harvested another bumper crop of sweet potatoes in October. We estimate that we dug up 1300 pounds of potatoes, with several potatoes weighing in at over 10 pounds!

Sweet potato harvest is always a fun group effort. We clip the potato vines and cart them off to a large off-site compost pile (thank you, Big Muddy Urban Farm in the Gifford Park neighborhood!) before we can start digging in the soil with our pitchforks. This year we found about ten snakes while digging the potatoes, as well as a number of field mice. That always makes for an exciting morning!

Everyone who helps out gets to take home sweet potatoes to store for the fall and winter. We donated two grocery cart-fuls of potatoes to the Underwood Tower, as well as took some to our local firefighters, donated a couple boxes to Marks Bistro for use in their restaurant, and took some to the Elmwood Tower for their residents and restaurant.

We donated just under 1000 pounds of total produce this year, with most of it going to our neighbors living across the street at the Underwood Tower.

After digging up the sweet potatoes, we planted a cover crop of three types of clover to over-winter and dig into the soil next spring. Cover crops help keep down weed growth, as well as provide nutrients for the soil.

We worked on increasing our pollinator habit throughout the garden this year, and we planted a "Bloom Box" of pollinator plants from the NE Statewide Arboretum this fall. "Bloom Boxes" are created by the Arboretum and the UNL Dept. of Entomology to educate gardeners and help them create habitat for pollinators using native plants and grasses.

Also this fall, we were recognized by UNL-Extension as being a Certified Nebraska Pollinator Habitat. Certification depends on providing a diversity of plant material for both nectar and pollen; having plants that flower from early spring through late fall; providing food sources for butterflies and moths in both larval and adult stages; providing shelter for pollinators to nest and overwinter; avoiding pesticides; and practicing sustainable conservation procedures.

The garden is being put to bed for winter, but you're welcome to stroll through the garden at any season. Many flowering plants will be left standing over the winter—the dead stalks, leaves, and seedheads provide food and protection for the birds and other wildlife that will spend winter at the garden. Happy Fall, and we'll be back next spring!


