President's Message

After a weekend trip to Kansas City, Hedy was inspired to do something to commemorate Dundee's history. The two of them came up with the idea of the streetcar wall, now visible to all at the Underwood-Happy Hollow intersection. Jerry and Hedy brought the idea to the DMPA board, where they were told I was a great idea, but too costly and time consuming. Jerry and Hedy said they could do it, with the help of the wonderful Dundee/Memorial Park residents, and they set out to get it done. Over the next year or so, they put together plans, renderings, selected a sculptor, negotiated with the city for the right to install it on city property, monitored the work as it progressed (at the sculptor's Beatrice studio), and supervised the ultimate installation, about 18 months after beginning the process. The project was made possible by donations totaling about \$150,000 all of it from neighborhood residents, and the dedication was held September 21, 2002. Jerry said the site was chosen because the Dundee Streetcar turned around at that spot to head back downtown. He said he hopes it will be there for years to come for all to enjoy. I might add that Jerry, and the DMPA board, remain involved in maintaining the structure, its lighting, and landscaping. We are all very grateful for Jerry's and Hedy's many contributions to the neighborhood over the years. Their daughter, Raquel, is carrying on their family tradition as DMPA board member and organizer of the annual Dundee garage sale weekend.

And from BJ Reed

"I really got active about a decade ago and the number of projects were astounding, in my view. They ranged from working on ways to improve the Memorial Park rose garden and working on an improved design of the Dundee Business District. We had Bill Kelly getting signs built to show the entrances to Dundee, with Dave Schinzel supervising their installation, work by Bill and others to get all the light poles painted, work by Cate Kratville to survey the neighborhood for historic district designation and on and on the list goes. Two of my favorite things included the luck of having Cate take all the [historic] building permits out to make copies and while she was doing it the City destroyed all the [old] permits east of 72nd Street – we have the only copies! Another was riding around a car with Bill, Cate, Bob Welk, and Marty Myers on Thanksgiving weekend rating Christmas lights. I am not sure we picked the best decorations, but we sure had a lot of fun! We never got the Bosco baseball statue replaced in Elmwood Park, but we can be proud of all our fellow neighbors making this the best place to live in the Midwest!"

I might add that, due to his heavy time commitments as UNO Vice Chancellor, BJ has recently stepped down from the board, but he still makes himself available to the board as needed, and has continued to be the "holder of the barricades" for neighborhood block parties.

Bus Rapid Transit "BRT"

At our well attended January meeting, we heard all about the proposed Bus Rapid Transit ("BRT") system, planned for the Dodge corridor between the Old Market and Westroads – Jason Ross, the BRT Outreach Coordinator, and Craig Moody, of ModeShift Omaha (and recently elected OPPD board member), were our presenters. This is a major project which I find exciting to see happen. To remain a city of vitality and attractive to young people, Omaha's challenge is to encourage development that allows city residents to reduce dependence on cars, and even eliminate the need for second, third or fourth cars in a single family. Just in the past two months, two young couples I know have told me they have eliminated their second cars! The development of Omaha's BRT is a tremendous first step in this direction, and will make a huge, positive difference, provided we all support it. If you did not make it to the meeting, you may go on line to OMetro.com and click on Bus Rapid Transit to learn about the project, and there more public meetings providing additional opportunities to ask questions, provide suggestions, and see how it is taking shape. Many decades ago, Dundee flourished because of the Dundee streetcar, commemorated in the neighborhood sculpture, and with a BRT stop planned for 50th and Dodge, Dundee will once again benefit from convenient, forward-looking public transit.

Garage Sale Weekend

This year's garage sale is scheduled for the weekend of May 18-21. That gives us all plenty of time to sort through our "stuff" with a view to lightening our load, clearing out clutter, and entering spring with a renewed vigor for keeping what we need and passing the rest on to others who may find more use for it. Whether we hold a garage sale, donate to a charity, or pitch into a recycle bin, it feels so good to de-clutter!

DMPA February Meeting – Film Streams

For our February meeting, on the 13th, Rachel Jacobson and Casey Logan of Film Streams will be giving us an update on the plans for our beloved Dundee Theater. Lots More Volunteers Needed for Flower Basket Planting March 24 and 25

Help Our Gardens Grow


Do you want to help your neighborhood this year? Consider a donation to the Omaha Sunken Gardens Project.

SUNKEN GARDENS REHABILITATION MASTER PLAN







BUS RAPID TRANSIT



Omaha has been known as a 20-minute city for some time. This figure is projected to grow in the next couple decades as our population increases and we see higher congestion and worse traffic on the roads. Metro's Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) project seeks to address this issue, marks a cultural shift in a car-centric city, and reflects a growing national trend – residents want a robust transit network and transportation options.

BRT is not a new concept, but a well-tested method of mass transit. Omaha is following the lead of cities around the world that have successfully implemented similar projects to transport thousands of people every day. BRT uses many of the same features of a light rail system at a fraction of the cost, and it can be easily expanded in the future through the creation of new lines or extensions. Omaha's first BRT line, located on Dodge Street and connecting major destinations from Westroads Mall to the Old Market, is scheduled to begin service in late 2018.



BRT will decrease transit time from Westroads to downtown by about 15 minutes and will make the total trip time comparable to driving. It will also provide a pleasant transportation experience with quality amenities, a comfortable vehicle space, and a relaxing and convenient trip due to the fact that riders have the freedom to read, nap, and, ultimately, not have to navigate the busiest road in town themselves.

Dodge Street was chosen as the first transit priority corridor because it hosts entertainment districts, education centers, health facilities, and employment areas. Traffic is expected to grow on Dodge and Omaha is out of room to widen the street. BRT will help move

more people within the existing space, and will intersect with almost every other bus line in the system.

BRT will connect destinations, support population and employment growth, and maximize transit access for the people of Omaha. This project will help create a livable, walkable, transportation-friendly environment by reducing road congestion and improving pedestrian and bicycle access. It will help improve air quality through reductions in emissions and the use of alternative fuels. BRT will bolster physical activity, public health, and alternatives to a car-dependent lifestyle. It will cultivate and reinvent public spaces. It will enhance opportunities for upward mobility. BRT will help attract and retain a talented workforce, particularly millennials and retirees who are increasingly choosing a car-free lifestyle.

BRT's efficiency is made possible with enhanced stations, upgraded technology, supportive infrastructure, and 60-foot articulated vehicles, which will run on alternative fuels.


